






In a time of social upheaval, in a city astir with dangerous new ideas, the son of a Catholic priest becomes a leader of a nonviolent revolution.



Monks devious and devout – and an age-defying royal pair – chronicle the history of their fictional island in this witty critique of Western civilization and history itself.

Eugene Vodolazkin, internationally acclaimed novelist and scholar of medieval literature, returns with a satirical parable about European and Russian history, the myth of progress, and the futility of war.

This ingenious novel, described by critics as a coda to his bestselling *Laurus*, is presented as a chronicle of an island from medieval to modern times. The island is not on the map, but it is real beyond doubt. It cannot be found in history books, yet the events are painfully recognizable. The monastic chroniclers dutifully narrate events they witness: quests for power, betrayals, civil wars, pandemics, droughts, invasions, innovations, and revolutions. The entries mostly seem objective, but at least one monk simultaneously drafts and hides a "true" history, to be discovered centuries later. And why has someone snipped out a key prophesy about the island's fate?

These chronicles receive commentary today from an elderly couple who are the island's former rulers. Prince Parfeny and Princess Ksenia are truly extraordinary: they are now 347 years old. Eyewitnesses to much of their island's turbulent history, they offer sharp-eyed observations on the changing flow of time and their people's persistent delusions. Why is the royal couple still alive?

In the tradition of Umberto Eco's *The Name of the Rose*, Julian Barnes's *A History of the World in 10 1/2 Chapters*, and Kazuo Ishiguro's *The Buried Giant*, Vodolazkin is at his best recasting history, in all its hubris and horror, by finding the humor in its absurdity. For readers with an appetite for more than a dry, rational, scientific view of what motivates, divides, and unites people, *A History of the Island* conjures a world still suffused with mystical powers.



At the stunning finale of *Brisbane*, all the carefully knit stitches unravel into a riddle: Whose story is it – the subject's or the writer's? Are art and love really no match for death? Is Brisbane, the city of our dreams, our only hope for the future?



Eugene Vodolazkin is the author of *Laurus*, which won both of Russia's major literary awards, the National Big Book Award, and the Yasnaya Polyana Book Award, and was shortlisted for the National Bestseller Prize and the Russian Booker Prize. Two other critically acclaimed novels, *Solovyov and Larionov* and *The Aviator*, have also been translated into English. An expert in medieval history and folklore, Vodolazkin was born in Kiev in 1964 and has worked in the department of Old Russian Literature at Pushkin House since 1990. He lives with his family in St. Petersburg, Russia.



In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus puts aside his usual parables and speaks plainly in language anyone can understand.

Like Francis of Assisi and others, Arnold chose to live out Jesus' teachings by embracing their self- sacrificing demands. In this collection of talks and essays, he calls us to live for the Sermon's ultimate goal: the overturning of the prevailing order of injustice. In its place, Arnold writes, we must build up a just, peaceable society motivated by love.



Eberhard Arnold (1883–1935) studied theology and philosophy, receiving his doctorate in 1909. He was a sought-after writer and lecturer in his native Germany. Eberhard Arnold and his wife, Emmy, were disillusioned by the failure of the churches to provide answers in the turbulent years following World War I. In 1920, out of a desire to put into practice the teachings of Jesus, the Arnolds and their five young children left their middle-class life in Berlin and moved to the small village of Sannerz. There, they founded the Bruderhof, an intentional community based on the Sermon on the Mount.

Smartly conceived and engagingly written, this volume follows Dickens's Christian thought through his oeuvre like no other book available. Dalfonzo's observations and assessments of the varied selections, based on her careful contextual reading, are astute and right on target - because she has a great sense of how Dickens thought, especially about his faith and how his faith came to bear on his life. Whether you've walked with Dickens for some time or you are just beginning to get to know him, you will want to own this delightful volume.

Take heart: Dickens enthusiast Gina Dalfonzo has done the heavy lifting for you. In short, readable excerpts she presents the essence of the great novelist's prodigious output, teasing out dozens of the most memorable scenes to reveal the Christian vision and values that suffuse all his work.

Dickens can certainly entertain, but his legacy endures because of his power to stir consciences with the humanity of his characters and their predicaments. While he could be ruthless in his characterization of greed, injustice, and religious hypocrisy, again and again the hope of redemption shines through.

In spite of – or perhaps because of – his own failings, Dickens never stopped exploring the themes of sin, guilt, repentance, redemption, and restoration found in the gospel. In some passages the Christian elements are explicit, in others implicit, but, as Dickens himself said, they all reflect his understanding of and reverence for the gospel.



A concentration camp survivor's classic novel of guilt and redemption

One of Germany's literary giants (he wrote sixty books in his sixty-three years), Ernst Emil Wiechert (1887–1950) was thrown into Buchenwald concentration camp for publicly backing anti-Nazi pastor Martin Niemöller. His final novel, published posthumously, deals with the aftermath of the Holocaust – how the survivors, both victims and perpetrators, seek healing and redemption as they pick up the shattered pieces of their world.

Evoking comparisons to the Russian greats, Dostoyevsky and Tolstoy, Wiechert displays an uncommon depth of insight into the human condition at its most degenerate and its ennobling best – an understanding born of his own suffering and quest for rebirth. His novel is peopled with rich and complex characters and charged with both violent feelings and spiritual hunger.

First published in 1950 as *Missa Sine Nomine* ("Mass Without a Name"), *Tidings* deserves its place among the masterpieces of European literature.







Now, for the first time, this story that has been celebrated in print and film can be experienced as a graphic novel. The challenges they face may vary, but the need for young people to stand up against evil, whatever the cost, will remain.





Nelson Mandela, the anti-apartheid hero and first leader of the new South Africa, is an international symbol of the power of a popular movement to fight structural racism. 

"I think we miss God," she writes, "I would never want to persuade anyone or put myself above atheists. I know there are good reasons not to believe. 

When Rachel Pieh Jones moved from Minnesota to rural Somalia with her husband and twin toddlers eighteen years ago, she was secure in a faith that defined who was right and who was wrong, who was saved and who needed saving. Luckily, locals show compassion for this blundering outsider who can't keep her headscarf on or her toddlers from tripping over AK-47s. After the murder of several foreigners forces them to evacuate, the Joneses resettle in nearby Djibouti.

Jones recounts, often entertainingly, the personal encounters and growing friendships that gradually dismantle her unspoken fears and prejudices and deepen her appreciation for Islam. Unexpectedly, along the way she also gains a far richer understanding of her own Christian faith. Grouping her stories around the five pillars of Islam – creed, prayer, fasting, giving, and pilgrimage – Jones shows how her Muslim friends' devotion to these pillars leads her to rediscover ancient Christian practices her own religious tradition has lost or neglected.

Jones brings the reader along as she reexamines her assumptions about



faith and God through the lens of Islam and Somali culture. Are God and Allah the same? What happens when one's ideas about God and the Bible crumble and the only people around are Muslims? What happens is that she discovers that Jesus is more generous, daring, and loving than she ever imagined.



Behind a gruesome ISIS beheading video lies the untold story of the men in orange and the faith community that formed these unlikely heroes.

In a carefully choreographed propaganda video released in February 2015, ISIS militants behead twenty-one orange-clad Christian men on a Libyan beach.

In the West, daily reports of new atrocities may have displaced the memory of this particularly vile event. But not in the world from which the murdered came. All but one were young Coptic Christian migrant workers from Egypt. In the tumultuous aftermath of the First World War, thousands of young Germans defied the social mores of their parents – and the constricting influence of the established churches – in search of freedom, social equality, nature, and community. Hiking clubs were formed and work camps organized, and hundreds of rural folk schools and communes sprang up across the country. In the 1930s, Nazism swallowed this so-called Youth Movement virtually whole.

A Joyful Pilgrimage is the engaging story of a remnant that survived: the Bruderhof, a community that began when the author and her husband, a well-known writer and lecturer, abandoned their affluent Berlin suburb to start a new life and "venture of faith."







Korea's demilitarized zone has become an amazing accidental nature preserve that gives hope for a brighter future for a divided land.

This unique picture book invites young readers into the natural beauty of the DMZ, where salmon, spotted seals, and mountain goats freely follow the seasons and raise their families in this 2.5-mile-wide, 150-mile-long corridor where no human may tread. But the vivid seasonal flora and fauna are framed by ever-present rusty razor wire, warning signs, and locked gates – and regularly interrupted by military exercises that continue decades after a 1953 ceasefire in the Korean War established the DMZ.

Creator Uk-Bae Lee's lively paintings juxtapose these realities, planting in children the dream of a peaceful world without war and barriers, where separated families meet again and live together in harmony with their environment. Lee shows the DMZ through the eyes of a grandfather who returns each year to look out over his beloved former lands, waiting for the day when he can return. In a surprise foldout panorama at the end of the book the grandfather, tired of waiting, dreams of taking his grandson by the hand, flinging back the locked gates, and walking again on the land he loves to find his long-lost friends.

When Spring Comes to the DMZ helps introduce children to the unfinished history of the Korean Peninsula playing out on the nightly news, and may well spark discussions about other walls, from Texas to Gaza.



Uk-Bae Lee was born in Yongin, South Korea, in 1960 and studied art at Hongik Art University. In 1986 he joined a group of artists whose murals, cartoons, and woodcuts represented the voice of the poor. He also held free painting classes for factory workers. Later, inspired to make a book for his own young daughter, he began his career as a children's book illustrator. In 2010 he published When Spring Comes to the DMZ as a part of the Peace Picture Book Project by illustrators from Korea, China, and Japan. Since then he has often talked to groups of children and parents about how individuals can work for peace. He lives in rural Korea with his wife, who is also a children's book author, and their children.

On 440 depleted acres in Sumter County, Georgia, a young Baptist preacher and farmer named Clarence Jordan gathered a few families and set out to show that Jesus intended more than spiritual fellowship. Like the first Christians, they would share their land, money, and possessions. Working together to rejuvenate the soil and the local economy, they would demonstrate racial and social justice with their lives.

Black and white community members eating together at the same table scandalized local Christians, drew the ire of the KKK, and led to drive-by shootings, a firebombing, and an economic boycott.

This bold experiment in nonviolence, economic justice, and sustainable agriculture was deeply rooted in Clarence Jordan's understanding of the person and teachings of Jesus, which stood in stark contrast to the hypocrisy of churches that blessed wars, justified wealth disparity, and enforced racial segregation. "You can't put Christianity into practice," Jordan wrote, "You can't make it work. As desperately as it is needed in this poor, broken world, it is not a philosophy of life to be 'tried.' Nor is it a social or ethical ideal which has tantalized humankind with the possibility of attainment. For Christianity is not a system you work – it is a Person who works you."

This selection from his talks and writings introduces Clarence Jordan's radically biblical vision to a new generation of peacemakers, community builders, and activists.

Inner Land

A Guide into the Heart of the Gospel

Eberhard Arnold

Now in five hardbound volumes

It is hard to exaggerate the significance of *Inner Land*, either for Eberhard Arnold or his readers. It absorbed his energies off and on for most of his adult life – from World War I, when he published the first chapter under the title *War: A Call to Inwardness*, to 1935, the last year of his life.

Packed in metal boxes and buried at night for safekeeping from the Nazis, who raided the author's study a year before his death (and again a year after it), *Inner Land* was not openly critical of Hitler's regime. Nevertheless, it attacked the spirits that animated German society. In this sense, *Inner Land* stands as starkly opposed to the zeitgeist of our own day as to that of the author's.



Eberhard Arnold (1883 – 1935) studied theology and philosophy, receiving his doctorate in 1909. He was a sought-after writer and lecturer in his native Germany. Eberhard Arnold and his wife, Emmy, were disillusioned by the failure of the churches to provide answers in the turbulent years following World War I. In 1920, out of a desire to put into practice the teachings of Jesus, the Arnolds and their five young children left their middle-class life in Berlin and moved to the small village of Sannerz. There, they founded the Bruderhof, an intentional community based on the Sermon on the Mount.

Plough's Academic Books

Plough offers a select range of scholarly, critical editions of Christian writings from different historical periods. We believe these texts remain important for the church and academy in order both to better understand the past and to renew individuals and society in the present.

Plough's academic mission goes back to Eberhard Arnold's publishing work in Germany in the 1920s and '30s. In 1924, he launched the Quellen ("Sources") series, in which he sought to make a wide range of primary texts – from the Church Fathers and Francis of Assisi to Zinzendorf and Dostoyevsky – available for a contemporary audience. Much of this work was yet to be completed at the time of Arnold's unexpected death in 1935.

Our academic line continues in this tradition of publishing important historical texts. The **Blumhardt Source Series** provides English translations of the work of Johann Christoph Blumhardt (1805–1880) and his son Christoph Friedrich Blumhardt (1842–1919), who affected their contemporaries with a vision of God's kingdom that extends beyond the spiritual to the whole of life. **Classics of the Radical Reformation**, a series started in the 1970s and adopted by Plough in 2019, makes sixteenth- and seventeenth-century Anabaptist texts available to an English-language audience. Scholarly introductions and annotations situate the writings in their historical context.

In addition to these book series, Plough runs the official **Eberhard Arnold website**, a digital archives of material by and about Plough's founding editor, to aid scholarly inquiry.

This series offers scholarly and critical editions of the primary works of Reformers of the Radical Reformation. Though scholarly, these books are also intended for a wider audience of those interested in Anabaptist and free church writers of the sixteenth century.

This ongoing series will make available in English the extensive works of Johann Christoph Blumhardt (1805–1880) and his son Christoph Friedrich Blumhardt (1842–1919), two influential religious figures of the latter half of the nineteenth century.

These sources will be of great interest to scholars of that period across various disciplines. The Blumhardt's influence can be detected in a number of important developments in nineteenth- and twentieth-century Protestantism: renewed focus on the eschatological dimension of Christianity; the rise of Pentecostalism; the convergence of socialism and the Christian faith; and the development of personal models of pastoral counseling. There is also much spiritual value in the witness of the Blumhardts, which continues to be relevant for the church and society today, since they represent a powerful instance of the convergence of spirituality and social witness.



Johann Christoph Blumhardt (1805–1880) was a Lutheran pastor and a key figure of German Pietism. Early in life it was clear to him that his life was to be used by God. Blumhardt studied theology in Tübingen and, after a brief term as executive for a missionary society, became pastor in Möttlingen, an obscure village of Württemberg, southern Germany. His experiences there are recounted in Plough's book *The Awakening* (page 70).



Christoph Friedrich Blumhardt (1842–1919) was born in Möttlingen and raised in an atmosphere of the reality of the presence of God, where faith was lived out practically and miracles came naturally. In 1880 the elder Blumhardt died, and the son carried on his father's work.


